## **GUEST SPEAKER**

**Speaker of the House Terrance D. Carroll (HD 7)**

Representative Terrance D. Carroll is the 54th Speaker of the House. He is the first African American in that top leadership role.

Speaker Carroll's first elective office was his current seat in the 65-member chamber, where he has served since 2003, representing House District 7. He served for 4 years as Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee.

Forty year-old Speaker Carroll is an attorney with Greenberg Traurig, LLP, as well as an ordained minister.

In February 1999, the Urban Spectrum Magazine recognized him as an "African-American Who Makes a Difference," and in September 1999, the Rocky Mountain News cited him as an "Up and Coming African-American Leader." In 2006, he was named a Marshall Memorial Fellow by the German Marshall Fund of the United States, a public policy institute dedicated to promoting greater understanding between the United States and Europe. In the January 2010 Power Issue of the 5280

Speaker Carroll was named one of 50 most influential people in Denver.

Speaker Carroll graduated with honors from Morehouse College in Atlanta, Georgia with a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science. He received a Master of Divinity degree from the Iliff School of Theology in Denver, as well as a Juris Doctor degree from the University of Denver College of Law. Speaker Carroll is also a graduate of the Summer Leadership Institute at Harvard University Divinity School's Center for the Study of Values in Public Life.
